Gernhart's fan mail has come from all over the United States, England, Ireland, France and New Zealand. Many friends of the Gernhart family have written to Jim, recalling old times. He had not heard from some of the friends since the turn of the century.

In addition to widespread publicity received in daily newspapers and national magazines, Ripley's Believe It or Not syndicate his contacted Jim recently, requesting a picture of him and the casket.
